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

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

Queue a Bollywood dance extravaganza accompanied by a host of terrified screams, cuts, bruises and the odd broken bone. Mat needs disarming and removing from the dance floor, Immediately.

GINGER AND THE TRUE RULES Ana stays at the family home leaving Mat to his own devices. Whilst exploring the comforts and delights of an Indian budget hotel, an explosive toilet shower attachment, a belligerent television remote control and a curiously questionable regard to hotel maintenance all teach Mat his first valuable lesson in the unspoken rules that truly govern the splendor that is India.
